He shares info about the USS Cobia to the public about the importance of Operation Overhaul. He encourages and welcomes donations for both the Cobia, as well as to our local Base.

There is one part about Greg you may not be aware of—he helped design and conducts two special Cobia tours for the museum. First is the Diving Deeper Tour. This two-three hour tour discusses living and working conditions aboard the boat. The other tour is the Nook & Cranny Tour, which focuses on how WWII submarines work, which includes visiting sections of the boat not open to general tours--including the engine room.

Who is he really?

Greg was born on the northside of Chicago at a time "long, long ago." The Vietnam war was going full force in 1966, so when he saw the opportunity, he joined the Reserves for one year before going active in 1967 as a machinist-mate (ME3). "I loved working with machines," he said, "but I didn't want auxiliary."

This young E₃ sub sailor saw duty in the Vietnam arena while serving on the USS Barbel (SS-580) and the USS Silversides (SS-236). He earned his dolphins in 1968 on the USS Carbonero (SS-337) and later earned his ME₅ (SS) rank.

He and his wife, Mary, reside in Addison, Ill. and will be celebrating their 38th wedding anniversary in June. Since leaving the Navy in 1970, Greg has worked as a tool-maker.

Family Grams were my salvation – and a challenge for me being new to the world of submarine life. Tom and I were married five months before moving from Nevada to Hawaii, with only the opportunity to wave goodbye to MS2 Tom Ramsay who sailed away for six months on the USS Omaha SSN-692).

I was told how I could communicate with him through a "family grams." And was quickly given these: "No-Nos."

What is "No" really

NO "bad" news, this includes car repairs, money problems, other non-happy news. PLUS, "keep it short." We were allowed a 45-word maximum family gram, counting the receiver's First Name, Last Name, and Rank. Which means it was a 42-word letter. All family grams were read by an unknown radioman in Squadron, and if it did not meet their criteria, the messages were placed in the round file.

As a trained writer and communicator, I took this as a challenge to see if my family grams got through. Too often I heard from other wives tell their husbands did not receive their messages.

Out smarting Squadron

My task through the next six years was to test out the skills of Squadron.

Family Grams from viewpoint of the family

Halloween was coming up and being married to a submarine cook, it is only natural that I send him a complete (sort of) Pumpkin Cookie recipe. I was testing the radioman's ability to send a message with "¼ tsp cinnamon," "3 TBL milk" – well you get the picture. I ran out of word space, so I left out how much pumpkin was needed. He was a cook—let him figure it out! I was happy to hear that he got the message.

During the Iranian crisis, the other wives were really upset that Squadron was not sending their messages which shared "car repairs," "bill payment issues," etc. I wanted to see how easy it was to get "good news" to Tom if no one else could.

Gottcha'

My family gram said something like: "Tom Ramsay, MS1. Congratulations Tom, you have a new baby brother. Your Mom and Dad have named him Bob. Both your Mom and Bob are doing fine. The Ice Man up the street is smiling and is excited too. Love Kate."



When Tom got home, he was still laughing at this family gram. It seemed the Captain personally came and woke Tom up to congratulate him. Coming out of a dead sleep after baking all night, Tom said" "Thanks Cap, that's nice, but can you imagine a 70-year-old woman having a baby? The captain looked at him and said, "She got us again, didn't she?" "Yep!" Tom responded.

There were many inside clues for Tom. His Mom and Dad were both older, and for some reason, his mom often called not only Tom, but his sister Sue, "Bob" when she got confused. Tom and I even received a Christmas Card to "Bob and Kate." The ice man smiling comes from something his Dad always told the kids: "I'm not your father, talk to the Ice Man up the street."

Branching out

I also found time to put my newsletter talents to use by creating newsletters with a column from a revolving reporter, named "Ralf," who kept him up to date on activities in the neighborhood. I also had a "serialized" story about a "monster size" cockroach that grew out of the sugar mills and terrorized the islands and local cruise ships. It kept Tom busy (and me) wondering what the next saga would be between the sub's mail ports. I expose my age when I state I didn't have computers, printers, email, or other electronic support. Can you believe it?







Read to believe: Only submarine sunk by its own Toliet.

When you've gotta go, you've gotta go. Even when you're 200 feet underwater.

But 76 years ago, answering nature's call actually sent a submarine to the bottom of the ocean.

Submersibles have been destroyed a host of ways over the years. Depth charges, naval and aerial bombings, collisions, even mechanical troubles have all dispatched them to Davy Jones' Locker.

But only one holds the, err, distinction of being done in by its own potty.

U-1206 was the pride of Nazi Germany's navy when she went into service in March 1944. Some 50 officers and men were assigned to her as she set out to attack Allied shipping.

Daily life aboard a U-boat was rough. They were built for combat performance, not comfort. Crewmen made their way around machinery and weaponry as best they could for months at a time. The food was bad, the air was stale and smelled of diesel exhaust fumes and guys who had gone too long without showering.

Then there was the matter of the "head," naval slang for the bath-room. U-boats had only two – and one was often used to store extra food for the long undersea voyages. That's right, all 50 men had to share one–and only one–restroom.

But U-1206 boasted a creature comfort most other submarines didn't have: A state-of-the-art high-pressure toilet that could be flushed while submerged at great depths. That was very important because when 50 guys are using the same facility, you want all the flushing you can get.

Without going into technobabble, the pressure system was extremely complex. Leave it to the Germans to devise a flushing mechanism that was so complicated, an engineer "specialist" had to be present every time it was used.

And it worked well ... until Saturday, April 14, 1945.

U-1206 had left occupied Norway eight days earlier and was cruising off the Scottish coast when something happened. Kapitänleutnant Karl Adolf Schlitt was commanding a U-Boat for the very first time. Naturally, that would drive up a man's sense of self-importance.

But it's possible Schlitt may have carried cockiness a bit too far because there are different versions of what happened next.

The skipper's official report says the intricate water pressure system sprang a leak. It leaked alright. But the crew told a completely different story.

They said Captain Schlitt had an inflated view of his mechanical competence. He didn't need any "specialist" to tell him how to work the new-fangled system. He could read the manual and make it flush all by himself.

Except, he couldn't.

When he pulled the chain, the sub began filling with water from the ocean combined with raw sewage from its storage compartment. Talk about a mess! Schlitt cried for help. But nobody could figure out how how to stop the rapidly spreading slop.

It eventually reached the U-boat's batteries. Saltwater and battery acid combined to create dangerous chlorine gas.

With toxic fumes quickly filling the boat, Schlitt had no choice but to order U-1206 to surface and open the hatch. Which is the most dangerous thing a submarine can do in wartime.

It didn't take the Brits long to spot the sub and attack her from the air. One crew member was killed, and U-1206 was so badly damaged she couldn't dive. So Schlitt had her scuttled and then gave the order to abandon ship.

Three men drowned during the evacuation. Nearby British ships picked up 36 others. The remaining 10 made it to shore in a lifeboat and were quickly captured.

In a way, U-1206's demise was a fitting metaphor for its homeland's sinking condition, because Nazi Germany was also going down the drain at the time. Within a fortnight, Hitler fired a bullet into his brain; the Third Reich went out of business a week later.

A Bit of History on right

March 11, 1918 --

The 'Spanish' influenza first reached America as 107 soldiers become sick at Fort Riley, Kansas. About 1/4 the U.S. population became ill from the deadly virus, resulting in 500,000 deaths. Death toll worldwide approached 22 million.

Submarine builders seek new recruits

NBC News (Virginia) -- Know anyone interested in helping build submarines? National TV commercials have begun to appear pleading for people to pass the word.

Helping spark this rush to find and train qualified builders is a new unified agreement between the heads of the U.S., the United Kingdom, and Australia to "provide Australia" with conventionally armed nuclear-powered submarines."

"Together we will deliver SSN-AUKUS — a trilaterally-developed submarine based on the United Kingdom's next-generation design that incorporates technology from all three nations, including cutting

edge U.S. submarine technologies," President Joe Biden, U.K. Prime Minister Rishi Sunak and Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese announced on March 13.

The SSN-AUKUS submarine is expected to be released in the 2040s. In the meantime, the U.S. will increase its submarine construction at its plants in Connecticut and Virginia and sell five Virginia class subs to Australia. EB is seeking 5,750 employees this year alone, let alone other companies.

Hence we are now seeing TV ads (even in our own market) looking for a different kind of recruit.

Navy targets Gen Zs with new Social Media ads

USNI News – The Navy is reaching out to Gen Z recruits in a new social media ad campaign targeting 17 to 24 year-olds "with a pitch to consider a career in the sea service," Navy officials told USNI News.

The goal of the campaign is to "influence members of Gen Z, their parents, teachers and other adults from whom they seek advice" to

consider a career in the Navy. The campaign doesn't focus on enlisted or officers.

It was reported that "just 2 percent of the youth market is eligible and motivated to serve." The campaign specifically focuses on those who are eligible but have dismissed the idea of a career in the Navy.

China arming unscrewed subs with torpedoes

NAVALNEWS.COM (France)-"New evidence points to China's
XLUUV (extra-large uncrewed
underwater vehicles) being armed
with torpedoes. "This is a significant
leap in this space and, together with
a large-scale development program,
may be out-pacing the West," H. I.
Sutton reports from Naval News.

Other Navies have been developing and exploring unscrewed vehicles. But, while "the U.S. Navy and Royal Navy appear to be in the lead both in experimentation and in orders," according to Sutton, China has five designs in the water, but their development has been "shrouded in secret."

Tolling of the Bells for Lost Boats

"To perpetuate the memory of our shipmates who gave their lives in pursuit of their duties while serving their country."

March

USS F-4 [ex-SKATE] (SS-23) lost on March 25, 1915. Loss of 21 crew when it floundered off Honolulu Harbor. Hulk raised and reburied off Sub Base, Pearl Harbor.

USS H-1 (Seawolf SS-28) lost March 12, 1920 while being towed after grounding off Santa Margarita Island, Baja, California, Mexico. Loss of 4 crew.

USS Perch (SS-176) lost on her first war patrol on March 3, 1942, when she was sunk by Japanese surface attack 30 miles NW of Surabaya, Java. Depth charges badly damaged the boat. Crew survived sinking: 59 men were taken prison, 6 men died as POWs. Only 53 survived the war.

USS Grampus (SS-207) lost on or after March 5, 1943 by a Japanese surface attack on the Solomon Islands. Loss of 71 crew.

USS Triton (SS-201) lost on March 15, 1943 when sunk during Japanese surface attack off New Guinea. Loss of 74 crew.

USS Tullibee (SS-284) lost March 26, 1944 while operating north of Palau. Loss of 79 crew. Believed to be a victim of a circular run by one of her own torpedoes on her 4th war patrol. The only survivor, a lookout, was knocked off the boat with the explosion. He survived the war as a Japanese prisoner.

USS Kete (SS-369) lost on or after March 20, 1945 when sunk on return to Midway (probably near Okinawa) at the end of her 2nd war patrol. Loss 87 crew.

Keel laid Oct. 25, 1943 Launched Apr. 9, 1944

Commissioned Jul 31, 1944 Presumed lost Apr. 16, 194



USS Trigger (SS-237) lost on March 28, 1945 in the East China Sea. Loss of 89 crew. On her 12th war patrol, this highly decorated boat was involved in operations leading to the Okinawa invasion when attacked by Japanese antisubmarine yessels and aircraft.

Action required:

Help Sub license plate bill move Through Senate

Here's an update regarding Illinois House Bill 4528 discussed in our November 2022 issue of *Green Board*. The Bill amends the Illinois Vehicle Code allowing the Illinois Secretary of State to issue special registration plates designed as United States Submarine Veterans plates.

Good news, House Bill 4528 passed in the Illinois House with:
